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

Areas of Demonstrated Strength and/or Progress

01: IMPLEMENTATION OF THE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM

The school has fully implemented the educational program, including key features, outlined in the school's charter and aligned to California State Content Standards specific to the grade levels served; and has achieved an overall rating of "3" or "4" in the Student Achievement and Educational Performance category of this year's oversight report

- School leaders highlighted key features of the school including an arts-integrated program based on the principles of Public Waldorf Education, which they described as an interdisciplinary and thematic approach emphasizing experiential, hands-on learning and daily integration of the arts, movement, and storytelling into "main lesson blocks." Review of documentation in Folder III, discussions with school leaders, and classroom observations included evidence of implementation of these key features. The school also provided professional development materials related to the school's key features (e.g., "Art of Teaching" and "Faculty Singing, Movement and Councils") and a description of the school's process for determining professional development needs, which includes teachers being surveyed at various times throughout the year.
- Prior to classroom observations, school leaders identified focus areas aligned to the school's key features and professional development program. During class walkthroughs, CSD staff observed evidence of implementation of focus areas including, but not limited to, arts integration (e.g., student work, thematic student made books, and classroom chalk boards incorporating art related to the thematic unit of study) and relationship-based learning (e.g., thematic drama instruction, collaborative groups, etc.). School leaders and CSD staff debriefed these observations with discussion of instances of pedagogy aligned to the focus areas and potential growth areas/opportunities for improvement.

04: SCHOOL CLIMATE AND STUDENT DISCIPLINE

The school has a well-developed and effective school climate and student discipline system that is aligned with the principles of the Discipline Foundation Policy and School Climate Bill of Rights, as demonstrated by schoolwide suspension event rate data less than 3%, and suspension disproportionality rates that do not reach or exceed 4.5% for the Students with Disabilities or African American student groups

- Review of documentation in Folder III, discussions with school leaders, and classroom/campus observations included evidence of systems to promote a positive school climate including, but not limited to, a schoolwide positive behavior support system (e.g., the school uses a consistent behavioral management approach to reinforce positive behavioral choices and set clear limits in the classroom and on the playground); alternatives to suspension and evidence of restorative justice practices (e.g., Circle or Council); systems to prevent acts of bullying (e.g., a tiered behavior intervention system that includes, preventative discipline, responsive discipline, and intensive discipline); parent workshops (e.g., Cyber Civics program that supports healthy use of technology); and professional development on topics related to classroom management (e.g., Projecting Confidence in the Classroom).
- Per the LAUSD Office of Data & Accountability's Data Sets for suspension, expulsion, and disproportionality, the school's 2022-2023 suspension event rate was 0.0%.

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Areas Noted for Further Growth and/or Improvement

O6: CLEARANCES AND CREDENTIALING COMPLIANCE

- Review of the *Certification of Clearances, Credentialing, and Mandated Reporter Training* form ("ESSA grid") and supporting documentation in Folder III revealed three (3) teachers did not have proper English Learner (EL) authorization for at least some portion of the time they were providing instruction to students in 2023-2024.
- In light of this issue, school leaders provided the following information:
 - o Two of the employees are scheduled to take the California Teacher of English Learner Exam CTEL at the earliest date available. The results will be sent to the CTC for review and their credential should be updated at that time.
 - o The third teacher has passed the CTEL; her results have been sent directly to CTC, but as of yet are not showing in the state system; school has a copy of CTEL results.
- However, as of the issuance of this report, no evidence has been provided that the three (3) teachers noted above are appropriately credentialed to provide instruction to English Learners and, as such, corrective action is required (see below). Please also see the highlighted note below as it relates to the overall rating in the Organizational Management, Programs, and Operations category.

Corrective Action Required

Charter School must provide evidence that the three (3) teachers above are appropriately credentialed to provide instruction to English Learners and/or that all English Learner students are taught by teachers with appropriate EL authorization.

Ocean Charter's 2023-2024 Norm Enrollment of 557 students exceeds the enrollment capacity of 532 students, per the school's operative charter. On November 17, 2023, the Charter Schools Division (CSD) sent an email to Ocean Charter requesting a plan to align the school's enrollment with the enrollment capacity identified in its approved charter for the 2024-2025 academic year. The email also noted, "for schools occupying LAUSD facilities, an increase above the enrollment capacity which could impact the usage of the site, would require a material revision approved by the LAUSD Board."

On November 27, 2023, Ocean Charter provided an email that did not include an enrollment alignment plan and stated, "since OCS is the sole occupant of the district site, the current enrollment does not impact the usage of the site." On November 29, 2023, the CSD reiterated its request for a plan to align the school's enrollment with the enrollment capacity in its operative charter. On December 22, 2023, Ocean Charter provided another response that did not include a plan as requested, but stated, "Ocean will work collaboratively with the district on this issue, including requesting a material revision if absolutely required, however it does not seem necessary in this situation." The CSD continues to reiterate the request for a plan.

The CSD noted that one of three invoices paid with the check, amounting to \$2,100, was for services rendered between September 2022 and October 2022, while the contract agreement was subsequently signed in November 2022.
 - Charter School's Fiscal Policies and Procedures: Page 10, Purchases & Procurement, Contracts Procedures of Ocean Charter's FPP approved by the school's governing board on 10/6/2022 states: "The Executive Director will approve proposed contracts and modifications in writing. Contract service providers will be paid in accordance with approved contracts as work is performed. The Executive Director will be responsible for ensuring the terms of the contracts are fulfilled."

As documented in Ocean Charter's 2022-2023 Annual Performance-Based Oversight Visit Report, an audit finding was identified in the school's 2021-2022 Charter School Facilities Program Close-out Performance Audit Project No.54/64733-00-073 pertaining to the Restricted Maintenance Account requirement. As of June 30, 2022, Ocean has deposited the cumulative amount of 2019-20 and 2020-21 to the Restricted Maintenance Account.

- 2. The 2022-2023 audited and unaudited actuals do not mirror each other. However, this has no impact to the school's total Current Assets:
 - a. Restricted cash in the amount of \$330,541 was included under Cash and Cash Equivalent in the unaudited actuals, but was included under Other Current Assets in the audited actuals.
- 3. The school's reported Norm Enrollment was 521, 568, 546, 552, and 557 students for Fiscal Years 2019-2020, 2020-2021, 2021-2022, 2022-2023, and 2023-2024 respectively, representing an accumulated increase in enrollment of 36 students (or 6.9%) since Fiscal Year 2019-2020. The school's reported Norm Enrollment for Fiscal Year 2023-2024 is 557 students, which is 21 students (or approximately 3.9%) above its projected student enrollment for Fiscal Year 2023-2024 (i.e., 536 students) per the school's petition enrollment roll-out plan in its operative charter. As mentioned in the Organizational Management, Programs, and Operations section above, since Ocean Charter is located on a District site, the CSD team has continued to communicate with the school to align its enrollment with the enrollment capacity approved in its operative charter. The CSD will continue to monitor the school's student enrollment through oversight.
- 4. A Segregation of Duties (SOD) review was conducted at Ocean Charter. No discrepancies were noted.
- 5. Per the LAUSD Charter Schools Accounting Unit's record, as of December 31, 2023, Ocean Charter owed \$962,941 in Proposition 39 over-allocated space reimbursement fees to LAUSD (consisting of \$415,134.72, \$364,575.75, and \$485,447.16 for Fiscal Years 2016-2017, 2017-2018, and 2018-2019, respectively, less payments of \$302,217). The school's 2021-2022 audit report disclosed: "On July 16, 2020, the Organization entered into an agreement with the District to fully reimburse the District for Proposition 39 over-allocated space during the 2016-17, 2017-18, and 2018-19 school years." The school indicated that it has authorized LAUSD to deduct the payment from the school's revenue account. The CSD will continue to monitor this matter through oversight.
- 6. Based on the school's 2020-2021, 2021-2022, and 2022-2023 audit report (and, according to the school), during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2012, the Charter School was awarded \$7,543,549 in Charter School Facilities Program funding established by Proposition 1D (* notated in the Financial Highlights section above). During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2018, the Charter School was awarded an additional \$28,521,085 Facilities Program funding established by Proposition 1D. The balance of \$10,300,218 in long-term obligations represents one-half of the costs incurred for the Charter School's approved Proposition 1D project. The site improvements made under the guidelines of the Proposition 1D award are being accounted for as building improvements. Current provisions allow charter schools to be on the title "in trust" through the State of California and the District, "in trust" being in name only with no property rights attached. Per Ocean Charter's 2022-2023 independent audit report, the balance of the school's long-term obligations (excluding the current portions, as of June 30, 2023) was \$10,644,102 (consisting of \$19,935 in Operating Lease Liabilities, \$9,735,298 in Proposition 1D, and \$888,869 in Notes payable).

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The provisions of Proposition 1D allow Ocean Charter to defer its loan payments until one year after it occupies its new school site. Per Ocean Charter, on January 9, 2018, the school initiated construction on its new school site, and was completed in April 2022 with the Final Notice of Completion recorded on April 28, 2022. Ocean Charter further stated that "the total construction cost of this project was \$77,000,000. [Out] of that total, \$20,277,475 was for land purchased and then deeded to LAUSD." Accordingly, Ocean Charter's repayment of its loan from the California School Finance Authority (CSFA) commenced in September 2022.

Per ExED, Ocean Charter received its fourth and final disbursement of augmentation funds in the amount of \$5.2M in August 2020, which brings the total augmentation funds received to date to \$41,357,427. Out of the \$56.9M construction contract budget, Ocean has spent/paid for \$56.1M in costs applied to the construction contract through April 2022. Ocean Charter currently has \$330,541 remaining in the budget from the augmentation grant to cover any remaining/final costs.

- 7. The (\$20,777,337) adjustment reflected in the school's 2020-2021 independent audit report (** notated in the Financial Highlights section above) was due to the overstatement of property and equipment. A restatement of the financial statements was needed to correct the misstatement. Entries were posted to correct property and costs of issuance as well as the beginning balance.
- 8. According to Ocean Charter, the net loss of (\$452,613) reported in its 2022-2023 Independent Annual Audit report and the projected net loss of (\$992,793) reported in its 2023-2024 First Interim report (*** notated in the Financial Highlights section above) were primarily attributed to the "\$1.5 million in site depreciation resulting from the \$58 million Panama site project. Without site depreciation, Ocean's net income would be approximately \$1 million. Ocean will continue to have net losses due to the large depreciation expense recognized each year from the Panama site project. The project value is depreciated over 40 years."
